Purdue University's Elliott Hall of Music buzzed in anticipation on Wednesday night as more than 4,000 rock fans waited for one of America's musical greats to take the stage - Bob Dylan.

Wearing a T-shirt with a young Dylan displaying his infamous "Look Out!" cue card in the Subterranean Homesick Blues short film, Indianapolis teenager Tim Otsu knew he was in store for a set of greatness.

The skinny lad with spiky hair spoke with as much knowledge as his mother, Peggy Otsu, who was among the "first generation" of Dylan fans. It was the second time mother and son caught one of the most celebrated songwriters alive. This time with his dad, Kiyoshi Otsu, in tow, the family wondered if Tuesday's election results would creep into the show.

As Dylan in recent years has been known to do, the 63-year-old spoke not a word to the audience in his nearly two-hour performance. Instead he let his music and lyrics speak. To him, Tuesday was just another historic day in the 40-year career of the man once known as Robert Zimmerman.

Still, one couldn't help but think about the young man on the cover of Blonde on Blonde with his bushy brown hair and intense eyes. His music drove the politically turbulent decade of the 1960s, but Dylan in 2004 left that image long ago. Dressed in a black Western jacket and cowboy hat covering his poofy dark gray hair, Dylan's latest sound is more bluesy-honkytonk than folk.

The biggest surprise of the night came with Dylan not touching a guitar at all. Instead, he sang from above a piano, rocking back and forth. On most tunes, he played the keys with one hand and gave some bring-down-the-house harmonica leads with the other.

Dylan was surprisingly the most animated on stage as his rock-solid backing band kept a laid-back persona. It was fun to see Dylan jerk to piano hits like a member of Devo.

The show started off gangbusters with the perfect one-two punch of "Rainy Day Women #12 and 35" ("Everybody Must Get Stoned") and "The Times They Are A-Changin." Both hits were far from their original version as "Stoned" received a Texas roadhouse flavor and "Times" was smoother and more effervescent than the original.

Other tunes on the set included "Shooting Star," "Million Miles" and "Honest with Me."

About 98 percent of the audience remained standing for the whole show with the first 10 rows being the most active as they bopped in the aisles.

Among the boppers was a father with his curlyhaired toddler on his shoulders. The youngster laughed with glee as he and dad bounced to the beat. Somehow you know the kid will be like Tim Otsu when he gets older, a young man who knows greatness when he hears it and sees it.
